Something from Sam

In March, the world celebrates St. Patrick's Day. But this holiday has a richer tradition than just dying rivers green and eating corned beef. The church remembers St. Patrick as a missionary to the Irish people, and his crazy life was a witness to a God who loves us and is with us in every situation.



Originally born in Britain, Patrick was kidnapped as a teenager and taken to work as a slave in Ireland. After six years of long, hard work, he managed to escape! On his run for freedom, Patrick found a place to stay at a monastery in France. Because of his time spent there, he eventually even became a pastor himself. With his newfound freedom, St. Patrick did the last thing anyone would expect — he returned to the land where he had once been a slave, carrying the message of a God who had come to set people free from all their sins. There is a prayer St. Patrick wrote and often recited as he traveled, and its beautiful words remind us today that the triune God is with us always, no matter what life may bring:

"Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger.

"I bind unto myself the name, the strong name of the Trinity, by invocation of that name, the Three-in-One and One-in-Three, by whom all nature has been created; eternal Father, Spirit, Word; praise to the Lord of my salvation, salvation is of Christ the Lord. Amen."

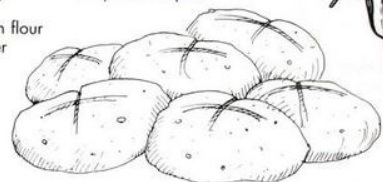
A hot cross bun is a spiced sweet bun usually made with fruit, marked with a cross on the top, and has been traditionally eaten on Good Friday in the United Kingdom, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Canada, India, Pakistan and the United States. Hot cross buns became **commemorations of Good Friday**, and across Christendom the cross came to represent the crucifixion and the spices symbolized those used to embalm Jesus at his burial.

MRS. RABBIT'S HOT CROSS BUNS

Traditionally baked on Good Friday, sweet hot cross buns taste delicious warm from the oven or toasted and spread with butter.

Ingredients:

- 1 tbsp dried yeast
- 250 ml (1/2 pint) milk
- 60 g (2 oz) sugar, plus 2 tbsp for glaze
- 450 g (16 oz) plain flour
- 50 g (1 3/4 oz) butter
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 tbsp water
- 100 g (3 1/2 oz) mixed dried fruit
- 2 tsp mixed spice



Method

1. With an adult's help, heat the milk in a saucepan until just warm, then mix in the yeast and 1 tsp of sugar. Leave the mixture in a warm place for 20 minutes until frothy.
2. Preheat the oven to 200°C (400°F). Combine the flour and salt in a large mixing bowl, then rub the butter into the mixture with your fingertips.
3. Add the rest of the sugar, the mixed fruit and the mixed dried fruit to the flour mixture and blend well.
4. Stir in the yeast mixture, then knead the dough on a floured surface for about five minutes. (Kneading means pressing and stretching the dough with your hands.)
5. Shape the dough into a ball, then put it back in the mixing bowl. Cover the bowl with a clean cloth and leave it in a warm place for 45 minutes, until the dough doubles in size.
6. Divide the dough and pat it into 12 buns. Place them on a greased baking tray and have an adult make a cross on each bun with a sharp knife. Bake the buns in the oven for 15-20 minutes, until risen and golden brown.
7. Mix two tablespoons of sugar with two tablespoons of boiled water until the sugar dissolves. Brush this glaze on the buns while they are still hot.



PETER'S TIPS:

Keep the dough away from draughts, or else it will not rise.

I had a conversation with my son recently about God. I was explaining to him the nature of the Trinity: We worship one God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. He quickly countered, "We worship one God? But three plus one equals four!"

If you've ever had a hard time explaining our Triune God to people—whether it be children, people outside the church, or even people who have been in church for a long time—you are not alone. This is what St. Patrick (the person for whom March 17th is named) was trying to do when he preached the Gospel in Ireland in the 400s A.D. According to tradition, St. Patrick used the shamrock (three-leafed clover) to describe God being three persons (three leaves) in one God (one plant).

Of course no analogy is perfect—our Triune God is beyond human comprehension! But if you're ever stuck trying to explain something as challenging as the Trinity, remember the shamrock. It is a powerful picture of the nature of God.

Frequently asked Questions

(The answer to the below question was taken from the LCMS Web site)



What can I say when Jehovah Witnesses come to my door?

When Jehovah Witnesses come to our door it is easy to reject out of hand our Jehovah Witness neighbors. Let me suggest a different approach. That is a brief way to witness to your faith when they come your way.

Jehovah Witnesses have been around since 1870, but did become a predominant group in the United States until the 1930's. They have a US membership of 1.2 million which is about 800,000 less than the total US LCMS membership. They reject the doctrine of the Trinity, the physical resurrection of Jesus, and say that Jesus only paid for the sin of Adam. This means that Salvation is possible only through works. Those works are studying the Watchtower Bible, obeying the laws of God and the watchtower, being baptized into their organization, and going door to door publishing the so-called good news of the Watchtower Society. They do not believe in a hell, but see unbelievers are simply ceasing to exist when they die. A special class of anointed believers totaling 144,000 will be in heaven with Jehovah, a second group of believers will eventually live in paradise on earth when the unbelievers are annihilated.

When speaking with a Jehovah Witness I would focus on the love of Jesus for sinners and because of his grace you are assured of salvation. If time allows one could share John 3:16 and/or Ephesians 2:8-9. Jehovah Witnesses are taught to only read their religious literature, so they may not take any periodicals you have to offer. What you can give them is a simple statement of what Jesus has meant in your life, and what he has done (think Apostles Creed). An attitude of love, rather than fear or dismissiveness, can also go a long way. Who knows??...God may use your small witness along with the witness of countless Christian believers to show them that salvation is a gift Jesus loves to give.
